

# Dear Friends

## An Easter Season Message of Hope

When I was offered, and accepted, the role of Team Rector of the Wilford Benefice back in January, I never dreamt that I would be writing my first article in the context of the suspension of all public worship in the Church of England and the semi-lockdown of society. This however is the stark reality presented by the Coronavirus Pandemic, that requires us all to make sacrifices to our normal way of life to ensure the common good, especially in protecting the health of the elderly and vulnerable. My public licensing service which was due to take place on April 28th at All Saints Hollesley was instead replaced by a telephone licensing by Bishop Mike; strange times indeed! However, I am delighted that I have now been licensed and can serve you.

Although we will not be meeting for public worship, we are foremost 'a people of prayer.' I will be maintaining the daily office of Morning and Evening Prayer when I will hold the people of our Benefice, and our health workers, schools, shops and businesses before God. I would encourage everyone to try to set aside a small space each day for a quiet time of prayer.

Alongside being a 'people of prayer' we are

a 'people of hope.' The glorious event of Easter Day, with the resurrection of Jesus Christ, means that we live our lives as people of the resurrection. Although we could not celebrate Easter Day in Church that does not detract from the fact that as Easter People, we live our lives with hope. Martin Luther King Jr expressed this hope in the following way in one of my favourite quotes:

*Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree.*

In these testing times we need to have the hope and faith to metaphorically plant our apple trees. To plan for the future with optimism and hope and explore new ways of worship and being church. Whilst it is looking like we will not be able to celebrate the Easter Season in public worship in our churches, may I take this opportunity to wish you all a joyful, and hopeful, Easter season in the love of the risen Jesus Christ.

Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Both were on Zoom with people looking into laptops or iPads at home. Before that we had a PCC rehearsal to see if it could work. Took us 20 minutes to get us all up to speed with the technology and we tested hymns with Audrey playing but the echo effect was too much. Responses also a bit echoey but worth doing.

So grateful to Janet Bishop producing and leading a shorter version of the Good Friday service (9 attended) and thanks also to Rev Robin Alderson and Roy Wisdom doing the same for the Easter Service (29 attended). We did in fact try a hymn 'Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia!' the sound was chaotic but it was hilarious.

There is something special about a zoom service. Instead of looking forward, you're

looking at each other and when each person speaks it's as if they are speaking to you as an individual. Made us all feel close. Many have written and here are some excerpts.

# Music during the Lockdown

As a consequence of the Coronavirus pandemic, we are all being forced back on our own resources at home, not least the members of Orford Church Choir. As there is evidence from around the world that church gatherings and choir rehearsals helped to spread the virus, it is uncertain when we will be able to rehearse together again, and whether social distancing will continue to impact church activities when the lockdown is relaxed.

We have naturally been looking at electronic solutions to enable us to carry on singing together from our own homes. Inspirational videos are all over the internet showing the members of the Rotterdam Philharmonic performing Beethoven's Ode to Joy, the Israel Philharmonic's Passover medley and the BBC Singers' 30-minute Matthew Passion; but these are sophisticated, cleverly-edited video recordings. So far, we haven't found an existing software programme which will allow us to rehearse together 'live' in real time – varying computer clock speeds and broadband speeds create a delay which is hard to overcome. It's like hearing your own voice coming back on a set of headphones with a delay – it's impossible to carry on talking.

So for the time being, there are solutions out there to help us keep practising – although unless you're a confident and unabashed bathroom singer, it can be hard to learn to sing in a room on your own. One of the best solutions is provided by

choral pied piper Gareth Malone, who has swung his considerable might behind the Great British Home Chorus, an excellent daily vocal exercise and song session on the web. His first live video rehearsal brought in 14,000 people from around the world and logged well over 137,881 views. You register for the project at <https://decca.com/greatbritishhomechorus/> and receive all the materials you need. On the Queen's Birthday, Tuesday 21 April, Gareth had reached rehearsal No 20, and 261,000 people were subscribed to his YouTube feed, where the rehearsals are streamed online.

Elsewhere, the Self-Isolation Choir is inviting housebound singers to rehearse weekly for a virtual performance of Handel's Messiah – accompanied by a specially home-recorded orchestra of professional instrumentalists and soloists on 31 May ([theselfisolationchoir.com](http://theselfisolationchoir.com)). This project runs in association with ChoralLine, a well-established company which provides facilities for home rehearsal of choral parts, and is much-used by members of the Orford Church Choir and Aldeburgh Music Club Choir.

In the meantime, we look forward to the time when we can begin rehearsing and singing together again. The three months spent learning Vierne's wonderful Messe Solennelle for Two Organs and Choir, for Easter, will certainly not go to waste...

As I write we have another most beautiful day and one which, we will spend outside in our field and garden...

Even if you have never gardened or paid attention to wildflowers and wildlife, I expect you are doing or wanting to do that now.

There is much in the media but here are a few ideas from me:

Make your outside space more wildlife friendly by:

- leaving your lawn uncut for longer
- fill your borders with nectar rich flowers – single petal ones so bees and insects can reach in
- allow some ‘wildflowers’ to make themselves at home – honesty, corncockle, poppies even Alexanders!
- encourage your trees and hedges to suit birds – Cotoneaster self seeds everywhere with us as do teasels which grow in one year and make the teasel in the next – get some bird boxes and plant climbers – we had a Wren nesting last year in one of our roses – we’re hoping the Swifts will arrive on 7 May to make homes in our new boxes
- leave a patch of nettles, the butterflies love them
- leave a woodpile or rough patch for little

animals and start your own compost heap

- put out water even if it is just a saucer for tired bees and birds

Places to look:

- The National Trust are showing their gardens off
- Sarah Raven does a weekly recording about what to do this week
- The National Gardens Scheme is doing virtual tours so take a look at those places you’ve always wanted to go
- RSPB for advice and ideas
- The Suffolk Wildlife Trust for beautiful photos

Grow some vegetables even if you haven’t before! Beans and salad are a great place to start. Put them in with your flowers! You can get seeds online, plants from The Orford Store and Ladybird. The Gardening Club visited last year and had a tour of this family business.

If you fancy trying out a new plant then Woottens of Wenhaston is delivering. Luci Skinner from there is speaking to us, at our November meeting this year



The birds do not practise social distancing and

their acceptance of diversity is satisfying – two great tits, a sparrow and a lady blackbird this morning, feeding on the ground from the seeds that fall from the feeder. At their windows men watch pigeons reconnoitre urban streets, circle the tarmac, fly off, bored. Here too, the quiet has lured birds to amble across the road, would that they remember their highway code. I now notice, which I didn't before.

At first there was shock and fear – cultural life was cancelled overnight. It was hard to cancel Mothering Sunday, as the equinox heralded spring and we came together. There were candles in our windows, rainbows appeared and the clapping started. No one can say that a village with homes on just one side of the road, can't make a noise: saucepans, much clattering, clapping and cheering, resounding also from Chillesford Lodge Estate a wood away – and at a safe distance we exchanged messages of hope.

Chillesford's community planning team, in the persons of Peter, Silke, Anna, Mandi and Heather, with a formidable range of relevant knowledge, skill and goodwill between them, has organised comprehensive neighbourhood support and we are all grateful to know that help is there if we need it.

I feel thankful that Holy Week and Easter fell as they have. Rachel had had to lubricate the lock on the church door before the ancient key would turn, the first time the building had been closed to visitors since 2006. But without walls, the Church rose to a challenge to be something else, as bishops, priests and deacons at all levels brought peace and prayers, from their homes, into ours. Here too, if our ingenuity didn't yet extend to incorporating YouTube song and music, we learned successfully

to zoom services, with valiant attempts at singing. I participated in Holy Wednesday Taizé and a Good Friday reflection, and Sudbourne's Easter morning service, which Simon Barrow co-ordinated with

Reverend Robin Alderson and Roy Wisdom. It means a lot to be able to continue to worship with our friends.

And who should hop across the fields but the Easter Bunny, who left delicious chocolate on the doorsteps of lucky children. Kit and Cara noted that chocolate supplies were low; their children did not have high hopes but were delighted with their chocolate surprises, for which everyone's thanks go to B Chocolates and Anna McCreadie.

As we walk amongst the bluebells, as we see the birds come home, as we ask ourselves what God, or Gaia or Mother Nature is telling us, we have learned, to echo John Donne's words *No man is an island entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main.*

One such offer was to privately fund the PPE for our daughter on the frontline. It will never be forgotten. We give thanks for being here in Suffolk where despite some vicious winds we open the curtains on most days to clear skies and strong sun. We have discovered new paths to walk along with birdsong a constant companion. This is a good area for food and there is enough bandwidth to be able to enjoy the other parts of our lives online. We are so lucky and feel very grateful. However, guilt too sits alongside as our thoughts turn regularly to those who are paying the heaviest price for our predicament. They are known to us. People in limited accommodation, without a green space, with fledgling businesses, the home-alone compromised and the younger generations who must shoulder the financial burden.

Perhaps Luis from Portugal will be allowed to stay after the end of the transition period? We need him. Remember to clap him and all key workers on Thursday evenings at 8 p.m. Stay well and in touch.
