ORFORD EMERGENCY GROUP

The Emergency Group met recently to review the risks to our local community and the response that might be necessary. It is anticipated that the main risk to the community is from flooding in the event that the river walls are overtopped or collapse. Other possible risks are from power cuts and being cut off through fallen trees or other incidents. The Group exists to ensure that the appropriate emergency services are alerted, to identify where risks to the community are and to provide assistance to persons at risk or displaced. If necessary, they will open and staff the Town Hall as a place of refuge.

The contact details of members were checked and appropriate amendments made – Chris Gill has joined the group to replace Ann Stewart who has moved

out of the village. The revised contact list is attached and is displayed on the Village notice board. The Group also went through the contents of the Emergency boxes which are kept in the Town Hall – they contain such items as torches, high visibility jackets, space blankets, whistles, camping stoves, kettles, first aid kits, megaphone and name badges.

ORFORD ORGAN PROJECT

As recent visitors to Orford Church will be aware, our Peter Collins organ has arrived! But not quite – the Diocesan Advisory Committee which must grant a Faculty for the organ to be installed asked us to erect a 'full-size mock-up' for them to inspect. We felt that it would be less wasteful of resources and more environmentally-friendly (because the mock-up would have to be thrown away) to install the real thing, so we asked our organ builders to bring the case, console and display pipes to the church, and this they have done.

We already feel delighted and inspired by the presence of the organ in the church, and the potential it offers to support and enhance our church service music, as well as concerts, recitals and – for the first time – the possibility of teaching, especially for young people. Do please come and have a look.

The DAC meets again in January. Because of the ongoing delays, we hope that the organ – which still requires some mechanical restoration following a long period in storage – will be commissioned and ready to play by August 2018.

In 2017 the Flower Show generated a surplus of £904 to take reserves up to £10,055. Our Friends were more generous than ever; income from them increased by £1,720. We removed the fixed gate entry fee and asked for donations on the gate instead; these came in only 15%/£352 lower than the previous year's gate receipts. We carried out £907 of overdue repairs to the shed and stands. We made a donation of £232 towards last year's Orford children's Xmas party. We intend to make a similar donation to a local cause this year.

THE RETURN OF RUST AND STARDUST

Picture the scene

It is August 1577. In Blythburgh Church the congregation is sheltering from a violent thunderstorm when a deafening clap of thunder bursts open the church doors and a hairy black 'devil dog' comes snarling in. It runs through the congregation, killing a man and boy and causing the church steeple to fall through the roof. Scorch marks still visible on the church doors are purported to have come from the beast's claws as it fled. He next appears 12 miles away in Bungay, where two worshippers are killed at St Mary's church. One was left shrivelled 'like a drawn purse' as he prayed. This beast was said to roam the East Anglian countryside spreading death and terror – a giant, ferocious hell-hound with flaming eyes and savage claws. For centuries, the beast that came to be known as Black Shuck struck fear into the hearts of all who crossed its path. Just a single glimpse was enough to impart a fatal curse; the briefest encounter sufficient to suck the life from any hapless victim.

Now fast forward to April 2018

St. Bartholomew's Church in Orford will be the setting for a new puppet play by Sussex puppet company Rust and Stardust. This young and talented company will be returning to Orford to work with Orford Primary School Arts Award students to develop and present a retelling of the ghostly story of Black Shuck.

Following two previous visits in 2016 and 2017 when they provided workshops for the children before performing *The Wild Man of Orford* and *The Green Children of Woolpit* to enthusiastic and captivated audiences in Orford Church, they are now returning to work with the students to perform the story of Black Shuck. To witness the characters coming to life in the hands of these skilled puppeteers is a magical experience and something not to be missed. Suitable for all ages.

ALDE AND ORE ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP

MODELLING OF THE WHOLE ESTUARY

The results of the flood risk study throughout the whole estuary are almost finalised. By the time this goes to print first views will have been discussed at the AOEP meeting. The draft minutes will be available on the website shortly. There will be a number of Community Meetings and drop in sessions in March (dates to be finalised) when there will be presentations on the work planned for the next two years. The next steps will be to agree schemes, apply for consents next year, coordinate the Government and donors funding to start mitigation works on the walls in the autumn (removal of rare and protected species etc.) in preparation for upgrading works to commence early in 2019. All of this will be discussed at the Community meetings.

FACTS ABOUT ENABLING DEVELOPMENT

Although there is a pause to the Enabling Development (ED) programme, it is necessary to address some of the mistaken rumours that still persist. The facts are:

- Landowners do not 'make money' from donating land and cannot buy it back
- In most cases donations to a charity, yours included, attract tax relief
- This is calculated on the existing use value NOT the full planning value
- Building is allowed in an AONB but has to be appropriate to the setting
- Protecting our heritage walls and landscape is a legitimate aim for public benefit through ED
- ED requires 'exceptional' planning permission and is very tightly controlled by SCDC. It is not a precursor to further planning creep
- Land will be sold with covenants to prevent significant amendment to the planning permission
- Historic England's guidance on the 'last resort' is guidance not law
- Several of the proposed plans offer homes of 2/4 bedrooms
- AOET is pursuing additional sources of finance (HLF bid, charities, individuals etc.), but these are unlikely to meet the total funding requirements of £12million

AOEP PROPOSALS: Concerned residents respond

A note on the QED meeting in Sudbourne on 2 December

Thank you to everybody who came to the meeting on 2 December at Sudbourne. Over 100 people came to find out more about the use of Enabling Development (ED), the unusual and exceptional funding scheme proposed by the Alde and Ore Estuary Partnership for strengthening river wall defences in the estuary. Nick Bridges, an architect who has worked on a number of ED schemes, gave an introduction on ED and planning legislation; and there was a lengthy, and occasionally technical, discussion on the pros and cons of this damaging proposition for our AONB. Members of the AOEP and associated organisations were there, and were given an opportunity to make their case in public. About 50 people left feedback forms for us, and we are working through their suggestions and questions – many thanks to all of you.

We want to make it clear that our group is absolutely in favour of strengthening the flood defences and we are acutely aware that those whose homes are at risk deserve our support. Our efforts so far through open public meetings have raised community scrutiny of the ED proposals. Perhaps partly as a result, the AOEP has chosen to pause the ED programme for one year. Their work on developing the Estuary Plan and ED options continues, and we will continue to support open and timely public scrutiny of these proposals to ensure sustainable outcomes for our communities and environment.

However, it's clear that there is more to do. We believe that the complexity, drawbacks and risks of the overall ED programme were not initially properly presented to the community by AOEP. Quite a few local people at our meeting told us that we too still have a way to go in explaining the consequences of ED simply, although they were pleased that we are trying; and so we shall continue to do that by:

- circulating a short, simple and plain English guide to Enabling Development and the flood defences;
- presenting our objections to ED with a range of interested local organisations including Parish, District and County Councils and the Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB;
- linking up with the Suffolk Preservation Society and the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) whose current campaign to protect the 34 English AONBs (cpre.org.uk) closely mirrors our local concerns;
- arranging a short series of workshops to explore issues underlying the Estuary Plan.

In all of this we are guided by the declared motives of the AOEP and the Alde and Ore Association – **to protect and preserve for public benefit the Estuary and the landscape in the AONB around it.**

For Home-Start, the snowflake represents 'the unique, fragile and vulnerable nature of the children and families we support'. These are families for whom the pressures of family life have become too great to cope with alone; this can be for many differing reasons, such as bereavement, illness, multiple births, loneliness or a variety of physical and mental health problems. Families are matched with a trained volunteer who supports them on a weekly basis, enabling them to grow in confidence, strengthen their relationships with their children, improve their health and wellbeing and widen their links locally.
