It is now over six years since Friends Garage ceased trading and we would like to assure you that we are as disappointed and fed up as you are with the lack of progress with the development of the site.

We had no idea that it would remain an eyesore for such an extended period of time.

The process was not helped by the wasted four years spent trying to work with the locally formed Community Interest Company before they withdrew from the project. Since that time, there has been a failed sale of the Seaforth House site and Mike, our developer, has suffered some serious health issues. However, by far the biggest delay to the redevelopment has been due to the East Suffolk Council Planning Department.

The planning application was submitted in August last year and it should have been determined by Christmas. Unfortunately the case officer handling the scheme has been on long-term sick leave since March this year. ESC Planning have readily admitted that they are desperately short staffed and the rapid turnaround of employees within the department has resulted in the garage planning application being passed from pillar to post with no one working on it long enough to issue a decision. Mike and his Planning Consultant have tried to keep things moving forward by continuing to answer any queries raised and satisfying any required actions. Having waited over ten months for a decision on the current submission, this week Mike has been advised that the planning officer who started to deal with the application has returned from sick leave and the decision will be issued by 18 July. Time will tell.

Orford Parish Council and the local District Councillor have been asked to apply pressure on ESC Planning in an attempt to expedite a decision. If you, as an Orford resident, are displeased at the length of time the garage site has been allowed to deteriorate and blight the entrance to your village, then please contact Ben Woolnough, Head of Planning and Building Control – Ben.Woolnough@eastssuffolk.gov.uk

### ORFORD MUSEUM EVENTS AT BUTLEY PRIORY

Orford Museum is delighted to welcome the travelling theatre group Three Inch Fools (www.threeinchfools.com) to Butley Priory on Tuesday, 26 August 2025 to present a musical version of Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Formed in 2015 by brothers James and Stephen Hyde the idea for the Three Inch Fools is simple – to stage a production that is inventive and fast-paced and to use music to bring to life Shakespeare's timeless stories. Over the past seven years the company has staged fourteen plays around the UK including *Macbeth*, *Romeo and Juliet* and *Twelfth Night*. The performance will start at 6.30pm (doors open at 6pm) and will take place outside, so please bring chairs, rugs and a picnic. There will be a twenty-minute interval.

On Monday 8 September, Ian Collins will talk about his book *Blythe Spirit: The Remarkable Life of Ronald Blythe*. Ronald Blythe (1922-2023), author of the inimitable *Akenfield*, was a prolific and poetic chronicler of rural and spiritual life, nature and literature. He spent a joyful century close to his Suffolk roots, time-travelling in his imagination and publishing forty-five books and thousands of essays.

Following this on Thursday 9 October, Peter Gutteridge returns to Butley Priory to continue his very popular series of talks on Nelson with one entitled 'Nelson – Disaster at Tenerife and the Battle of the Nile'.

On Thursday 6 November, well-known journalist and Woodbridge resident, Simon Pearson, will talk about his book *The Great Escaper: the Life and Death of Roger Bushell* which tells the story of Roger Bushell – aka 'Big X' – the man who master-minded the 'Great Escape' in 1944 and was played by Richard Attenborough in the famous film twenty years later.

On Monday 24 November Iain Murison will give a talk entitled 'Afghanistan – a genuine and personal insight'. Iain joined the Corps of Royal Engineers in 1984 where he served for thirty years spending time in a variety of conflicts including Northern Ireland, Bosnia, Afghanistan, Iraq and Sierra Leone. He was shaped by his experiences and retired in 2014. This presentation is an insightful personal account of the most challenging and fulfilling campaign in recent years, a true testament of leadership through the most intense adversity.

There were thirteen players on the ground, our team, the local lads of the Sudbourne cricket team and two batsmen from the visiting Stowmarket team. Some were slim and agile boys, others were a tad older and a wee bit larger in girth but all played with the utmost attention and zeal.

One young bowler, probably the smallest player on the pitch, removed the centre stump to a roar of applause, while the wicket keeper took his revenge on a daisy cutting batsman, and in between, there were some magical catches to be appreciated and applauded.

Then came the tea interval and Pimm's, and what a spread there was for everyone, the teams, umpires, the scorers, Uncle Tom Cobley and all in the archetypal Sudbourne pavilion of his Lordship; the idea of having to run between the wickets after such a spread was a mere passing thought!

Then it was back onto the field for the visitors to bat. The final score had Sudbourne beating Stowmarket by thirty-two runs, a victory indeed, however, it was playing the game which mattered most.

The great Lords Cricket Ground, with Old Father Time watching over the game, it was not, but AG Macdonnell's 'England, their England' it certainly was, and long may it last.
