HOUSING IN ORFORD

New Orford Town Trust's primary duty is to look after its properties and other assets. After major work was needed to the Town Hall and Quay some years ago NOTT was left with very limited funds. Since then the Trustee has worked hard to put money aside for future maintenance, and in around 2016 under the guidance of the Chairman Ian Thornton and the then Vice Chairman Matthew Smy, was able to set aside further funds for housing to purchase first one property, and then a second, with the help of a very generous donation from a charitable foundation. This has enabled two local families to have homes in the village, close to their families.

Although the purchase of these properties has been a huge achievement, we are aware that more needs to be done, and it's not something the Parish Council or NOTT can do on their own. We all need to recognise the problem and work together to ensure that Orford continues to be a busy and thriving village, with people living here all year round.

Snape Maltings Concert Hall, Saturday 16 November 2024 at 7pm.

Aldeburgh Music Club – founded by Benjamin Britten in 1952 – returns to Britten's Snape Maltings Concert Hall on 16 November with one of the greatest choral works of all time – the B Minor Mass by JS Bach.

Completed in 1749 but never heard in his lifetime, Bach created a magnificent masterpiece that never fails to move and enchant its audience. Aldeburgh Music Club Choir will be accompanied by the Suffolk Baroque Players, led by Kathryn Parry, and be joined by a brilliant quartet of locally-based professional soloists – Christina Johnston (soprano), Diana Moore (mezzo-soprano), Rory Carver (tenor) and Rod Gildon (bass). The performance will be conducted by the Club's Director of Music, Tom Appleton.

ORFORD MUSEUM EVENTS AT BUTLEY PRIORY

Horatio Nelson – The Making of a Hero

On 25 November 2024, Peter Gutteridge will tell the story of Nelson's early life from his birth in 1758 in the small Norfolk village of Burnham Thorpe through to the battle of Cape St. Vincent on 14 February, 1797 which established him as one of the nation's great heroes. The talk will identify the myths from reality and seek to explain his 'Dreams of Glory'.

Peter is a retired senior partner of a large law firm and now a regular speaker on naval and maritime history subjects and, in particular, Horatio Nelson. He is a long-standing member of the Nelson Society and has

Masters' degrees in Maritime History from Greenwich University and History from Cambridge University. His interest in Nelson was originally fostered by his grandfather, Professor HC Gutteridge, who was a distinguished academic and author of 'Nelson and the Neapolitan Jacobins'.

Agincourt: The Legend of England

On 27 January, 2025, Jamie Lowther Pinkerton, Suffolk born and bred with a deep interest in its past, will come to Butley Priory to talk about the battle of Agincourt.

'Tarry, dear cousin Suffolk! My soul shall thine keep company to heaven: Tarry, sweet soul, for mine, then fly abreast; As, in this glorious and well-foughten field, we kept together in our chivalry!'

Edward, Duke of York to the Earl of Suffolk, as they lay dying on the field of Agincourt. (The Life of King Henry V, Act IV, Scene 7)

On the evening of 24 October, 1415, a bedraggled, disease-ridden, exhausted little army huddled around its campfires for what many in its ranks feared would be their last night on earth. Their way to Calais and safety was blocked by a superbly equipped French army, fresh and vastly superior in numbers. The next afternoon, with improbable victory won, King Henry V of England enquired of the French herald, Montjoie, the name of the fortified manor house they could see on the edge of the battlefield: 'Azincourt,' came the reply. Agincourt.

Immortalised by Shakespeare – if it needed immortalising – the extraordinary victory at Agincourt, total, and against all odds, marked the high point of English arms in The Hundred Years War. Its name rolls off the tongue alongside Crecy and Poitiers, the great triumphs of Edward III two generations earlier. But Agincourt is different. Agincourt forms part of the very fabric of how English people have viewed themselves and, for some, still do today. It sits alongside Trafalgar and the Battle of Britain in defining us, both in our eyes and through the eyes of others. Jamie will describe the campaign and the battle and will attempt to view it from something of a soldier's perspective, however remote, and – thankfully! – different his military experience was from those who fought at Agincourt.

Jamie Lowther-Pinkerton grew up at Alderton and now lives across the fields from Sutton Hoo. For twenty years he was an officer in the British Army and subsequently Principal Private Secretary to the then Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and Prince Harry. He is an ambassador for the HALO Trust, the world's largest humanitarian mine-clearance charity, and Waterloo Uncovered, a charity engaged in the excavation of the battlefield of Waterloo by world-class archeologists working alongside military veterans recovering from wounds and injuries.

All the above talks start at 6pm and last about an hour and a half. Tickets cost £15 for Friends of Orford Museum, £20 for guests and include a complimentary glass of wine.

National patient survey – Peninsula results

PENSION CREDIT

"I made a claim for Pension Credit and got money off my new glasses"

You might be eligible for Pension Credit if you've reached State Pension age. Pension Credit doesn't just top up your income, it comes with extra advantages:

- free NHS dental treatment, help towards the cost of glasses and transport to hospital
- help with housing costs (rent or mortgage interest)
- a free TV Licence if you are 75 or over
- Winter Fuel Payment of up to £300
- Warm Home Discount of £150
- A Cold Weather Payment of £25 per day in periods of very cold weather
- Extra money if you care for someone (up to £45.60 per week), or if you have a disability (up to £81.50 per week)

You can apply if you own your own home and may be eligible even if you have some savings. You have nothing to lose by applying. If you've previously been turned down, you can still make a new claim each year. For more information, or to apply, call 0800 99 1234 or visit www.gov.uk/pension-credit
